Information for participants travelling to Maynooth

This event will take place in MUSSI Seminar Room 2.31, 2nd Floor, lontas Building, North Campus Maynooth University. (Building marked with red arrow on map attached with the closest car parks also indicated). The North campus is located about 15 min. walk from the train station and 10 min. walk from the university accommodation.

Morning coffee and lunch will be served on both days; lunch includes vegetarian options. Additionally, there is a shop outside the conference venue that sells coffee and snacks.

Travelling to Maynooth

The best option to travel to Maynooth from Dublin Airport is city transport. Buses number 16 and 41 pick up in front of Terminal 1 and you can ride there to Drumcondra Train Station. There are regular trains from Drumcondra to Maynooth (check times on <u>irishrail.ie</u>). Bus fare is about 2.90 Euros (exact fare only, e.g. coins) and the train will cost 4 Euros. Depending on connections the journey will take about 60-70 minutes.

Another option is to take a taxi from the rank in front of arrivals and ask to be dropped off at the Maynooth University reception. The fare will be about 60 Euros and journey will take about 30 minutes.

<u>Accommodation</u>

Those of you looking for accommodation, please contact Maynooth University booking at reservations@spcm.ie. They offer a discounted rate for guests of the University. For single occupancy the cost is €39.00 per night and for sharing occupancy the rate is €33.00 per person per night. The key collection reception located in the South Campus is open 8:00-23:00.
